Choosing a dental professional is one of the most important healthcare decisions you can make. Understanding what qualifications your dentist or dental specialist holds — and what those qualifications actually mean — helps you make an informed choice about your care.

This guide explains the regulatory framework for dental practice in Australia, what distinguishes a dental specialist from a general dentist, and how you can verify the credentials of any dental practitioner.

AHPRA — The National Regulator

In Australia, all dental practitioners are regulated by the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) in partnership with the Dental Board of Australia. This national registration system was established to protect the public by ensuring that all practising dental professionals meet consistent standards of education, training, and professional conduct.

What AHPRA Registration Means

When a dental practitioner is registered with AHPRA, it means they have:

- **Completed an accredited qualification** — either an Australian dental degree or an equivalent overseas qualification that has been assessed and recognised
- **Met the registration standards** — including English language proficiency, professional indemnity insurance, recency of practice, and criminal history checks
- **Agreed to abide by professional codes** — including the Dental Board of Australia's Code of Conduct and professional standards
- **Committed to continuing professional development** — ongoing learning requirements that must be met throughout their career

Types of AHPRA Registration for Dental Practitioners

AHPRA maintains several categories of dental registration:

- **General registration** — the standard registration for dentists, dental specialists, dental hygienists, dental therapists, oral health therapists, and dental prosthetists
- **Specialist registration** — an additional category specifically for dentists who have completed recognised specialist training in one of the thirteen dental specialties
- **Limited registration** — for specific circumstances such as supervised practice, postgraduate training, or teaching and research

The key distinction for patients to understand is between general registration (as a dentist) and specialist registration.

What Makes a Dental Specialist Different?

In Australia, the title "specialist" is legally protected. A dentist cannot call themselves a specialist unless they hold specialist registration with AHPRA in one of the recognised dental specialties. This is not a marketing label — it is a regulated designation with specific educational and training requirements.

The Pathway to Specialist Registration

To become a registered dental specialist in Australia, a dentist must:

1. **Complete a dental degree** — typically five years of full-time undergraduate or graduate-entry study at an accredited university
2. **Gain clinical experience** — most specialist training programs require candidates to have worked as a general dentist for a period before entering specialist training
3. **Compete for a specialist training position** — entry to specialist programs is highly competitive, with far more applicants than places available
4. **Complete an accredited specialist training program** — an additional three to five years of full-time postgraduate study at a university-accredited program, involving advanced clinical training, academic coursework, and original research
5. **Pass specialist examinations** — rigorous examinations that assess both theoretical knowledge and clinical competence at an advanced level
6. **Apply for specialist registration with AHPRA** — providing evidence of completed training and examination results

Total Training Investment

By the time a dental specialist begins independent practice, they have typically completed:

- **Five years** of undergraduate or graduate-entry dental training
- **Two or more years** of general dental practice
- **Three to five years** of full-time specialist postgraduate training
- **Total: Ten to twelve years** of university-level education and supervised clinical training

This is comparable to the training pathway for medical specialists and reflects the complexity and depth of knowledge required to practise at a specialist level.

The Thirteen Recognised Dental Specialties in Australia

The Dental Board of Australia recognises thirteen dental specialties:

1. **Dento-maxillofacial radiology** — specialist imaging and diagnosis of the teeth, jaws, and face
2. **Endodontics** — treatment of the dental pulp and root canal system
3. **Forensic odontology** — dental identification and legal aspects of dentistry
4. **Oral and maxillofacial surgery** — surgical treatment of conditions affecting the mouth, jaws, and face
5. **Oral medicine** — diagnosis and management of diseases and disorders of the mouth
6. **Oral pathology** — study and diagnosis of diseases affecting the oral and maxillofacial regions
7. **Orthodontics** — diagnosis and treatment of dental and facial irregularities
8. **Paediatric dentistry** — dental care for children and adolescents
9. **Periodontics** — treatment of diseases affecting the gums and supporting structures of the teeth
10. **Prosthodontics** — restoration and replacement of teeth
11. **Public health dentistry** — community-level dental health programs and policy
12. **Special needs dentistry** — dental care for patients with physical, medical, intellectual, or psychiatric conditions
13. **Oral surgery** — surgical procedures within the oral cavity

At Collins Street Specialist Centre, we have specialists in six of these disciplines: orthodontics, endodontics, periodontics, prosthodontics, oral and maxillofacial surgery, and paediatric dentistry. This covers the specialties most commonly needed by patients seeking specialist dental care.

How to Verify a Dental Practitioner's Credentials

One of the most valuable features of Australia's national registration system is transparency. You can verify the registration and specialist status of any dental practitioner through the AHPRA public register.

Using the AHPRA Register

1. Visit **www.ahpra.gov.au** 2. Click on **"Check a practitioner"** or use the **"National Register Search"** 3. Search by the practitioner's **name** or **registration number** 4. The register will show: - Their registration type (general, specialist, or limited) - Their profession and division - For specialists: their recognised specialty - Any conditions or undertakings on their registration - Whether their registration is current

What to Look For

- **"Specialist Registration"** in the registration type — this confirms the practitioner is a registered specialist, not simply a general dentist with a particular interest in an area - **The specific specialty listed** — for example, "Orthodontics" or "Periodontics" - **Current registration status** — registration must be active and current - **No adverse notations** — conditions, undertakings, or reprimands may appear on the register if a practitioner has been subject to regulatory action

Red Flags

Be cautious of dental practitioners who:

- Use terms like "specialist interest" or "special interest" rather than claiming specialist registration — this may indicate they are a general dentist with a focus area rather than a registered specialist - Cannot provide their AHPRA registration number when asked - Do not appear on the AHPRA public register - List qualifications from unrecognised institutions

It is important to note that general dentists with a particular interest in a field can provide excellent care in that area. The distinction is not about quality per se — it is about the level of formal training and the legal authority to use the title "specialist."

Professional Memberships and Societies

Beyond AHPRA registration, many specialists hold memberships in professional societies and academies that represent their specialty. While membership in these organisations is not a regulatory requirement, it generally indicates a commitment to ongoing professional development and engagement with the specialist community.

Relevant Professional Organisations

- **Australian Dental Association (ADA)** — the peak professional body for dentistry in Australia - **Australian Society of Orthodontists (ASO)** — the specialist society for orthodontists - **Australian and New Zealand Academy of Periodontists (ANZAP)** — the specialist society for periodontists - **Australian Prosthodontic Society (APS)** — the specialist society for prosthodontists - **Australian and New Zealand Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (ANZAOMS)** — the specialist society for oral and maxillofacial surgeons - **Australian Society of Endodontology (ASE)** — the specialist society for endodontists - **Australasian Academy of Paediatric Dentistry (AAPD)** — the specialist society for paediatric dentists - **Royal Australasian College of Dental Surgeons (RACDS)** — offers fellowship examinations and promotes standards of practice

What Fellowships Mean

Some specialists hold fellowships (such as FRACDS — Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Dental Surgeons). These are typically awarded after passing additional examinations that assess advanced knowledge and clinical competence. A fellowship is a mark of distinction that demonstrates a

commitment to excellence beyond the minimum requirements for specialist registration.

Continuing Professional Development Requirements

AHPRA registration is not a one-time achievement. All registered dental practitioners must meet ongoing continuing professional development (CPD) requirements to maintain their registration.

Current CPD Requirements

The Dental Board of Australia requires all registered dental practitioners to complete a minimum of 60 hours of CPD over each three-year registration period, including:

- **Scientific content** — keeping up to date with developments in dental science, techniques, and materials
- **CPD related to the practitioner's scope of practice** — ensuring competence in the areas in which they practise
- **Activities that include peer interaction** — such as courses, conferences, workshops, or peer review

How Our Specialists Exceed These Requirements

The specialist training, registration, and CPD system exists to ensure that when you see a dental specialist, you are seeing someone who has been rigorously trained, examined, and held to ongoing professional standards. It is a quality assurance system built over decades of professional and regulatory development.

Informed Decision-Making

Knowing what qualifications to look for — and how to verify them — puts you in a stronger position to make informed choices about your dental care. You do not need to take claims at face value; you can check them independently through the AHPRA register.

Accountability

Registered practitioners are accountable to AHPRA and the Dental Board of Australia. If a practitioner's conduct or competence falls below the expected standards, patients and other practitioners can raise concerns with AHPRA, which has the power to investigate and take action.

Frequently Asked Questions

****What is the difference between a dentist and a dental specialist?**** A dentist has completed a dental degree (typically five years) and holds general registration with AHPRA. A dental specialist has completed an additional three to five years of full-time postgraduate training in a specific area and holds specialist registration with AHPRA. The title "specialist" is legally protected in Australia.

****Can a general dentist perform specialist procedures?**** General dentists can perform a wide range of procedures within their scope of competence. However, complex cases and certain procedures are best managed by specialists who have the advanced training, experience, and equipment specific to that area. Your general dentist will typically refer you to a specialist when your case warrants it.

****How do I check if my dentist is a registered specialist?**** Visit the AHPRA public register at www.ahpra.gov.au, search for your practitioner by name, and look for "Specialist Registration" in their registration details along with their specific specialty.

****What does AHPRA stand for?**** AHPRA stands for the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency. It is the national organisation responsible for the registration and regulation of health practitioners across Australia, including dentists and dental specialists.

****Are overseas-qualified specialists recognised in Australia?**** Overseas-qualified dental specialists must have their qualifications assessed by the Australian Dental Council (ADC) and meet all AHPRA registration requirements before they can practise as specialists in Australia. This may involve additional examinations and supervised practice.

****What should I do if I have concerns about a dental practitioner?**** If you have concerns about the conduct, health, or performance of a dental practitioner, you can contact AHPRA directly to lodge a notification. AHPRA has the authority to investigate and take regulatory action where appropriate.

****Are all specialists at CSSC registered with AHPRA?**** Yes. Every specialist at Collins Street Specialist Centre holds current specialist registration with AHPRA in their area of practice. You are welcome to verify this through the AHPRA public register at any time.
