What is a specialist orthodontist — and how do they differ from a general dentist?

The regulatory definition

In Australia, the title "specialist orthodontist" carries a specific legal meaning governed by the Dental Board of Australia (DBA) and the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA). AHPRA publishes an online register of all dental practitioners, which includes specialty registration details for clinicians who hold specialist registration. You can verify any clinician's specialist status directly on the AHPRA website before booking an appointment — and we encourage every patient to do so.

Beyond a general dental degree, an orthodontist completes a further three-year full-time university postgraduate programme in orthodontics. The prerequisites are demanding: AHPRA-registered general dental qualification plus a minimum of two years' clinical experience as a practising dentist. In practice, that means roughly nine to ten years of formal university education before a clinician is certified to practise as a specialist orthodontist.

The postgraduate degree — typically a Doctor of Clinical Dentistry (Orthodontics) or equivalent — combines foundational sciences with clinical training specific to orthodontic care, including advanced facial and cranial anatomy, the biomechanics of tooth movement, and the relationship between bone development and treatment timing.

Why the distinction matters clinically

General dentists can, and many do, perform orthodontic treatment. Some undertake additional training through a weekend course or short intensive programme, then advertise services such as Invisalign or braces. Some describe themselves as "orthodontic dentists" — a term that simply means a general dentist who provides orthodontic treatment, not a clinician who holds specialist registration.

A 2021 peer-reviewed study published in **The Angle Orthodontist** (d'Apuzzo et al.) examined treatment management differences between orthodontists and general practitioners performing clear aligner therapy. Orthodontists were more likely to identify a malocclusion as too complex for clear aligners, and more likely to conclude that outcomes would have improved with conventional braces. There were meaningful differences in case selection, treatment management, and aligner expertise between the two groups — both treated moderate to severe malocclusions using aligners, but with divergent use of recommended auxiliaries, pointing to different treatment goals.

A 2024 cross-sectional survey of general dentists in Australia, published in **Orthodontics & Craniofacial Research**, found that 68.7% of respondents reported tooth positions mostly or always needed changes to the initial clear aligner treatment plan. Patient compliance and the predictability of outcomes were the most commonly flagged problems. Over 80% of general dentists who did not provide clear aligner therapy said they preferred to refer to a specialist orthodontist.

What this means for Melbourne patients: for complex bite correction, skeletal discrepancies, cases involving extractions or jaw surgery, or treatment in children where growth management matters, a specialist orthodontist is the right clinical choice. For straightforward adult crowding and spacing, an experienced general dentist aligner provider may achieve comparable results — but the starting point should always be an accurate diagnosis by someone trained to see the full clinical picture.

The four main orthodontic appliance types in Melbourne

1. Traditional metal braces

Metal braces remain one of the most widely used and clinically versatile orthodontic treatments in Melbourne. Metal brackets and wires are bonded to the teeth with a specialised dental cement, making them a fixed appliance that works continuously regardless of patient compliance with wear schedules.

For severe crowding, significant bite correction, and cases requiring precise three-dimensional control of tooth movement, metal braces are the clinical benchmark. For teenagers with more complex alignment needs, they are typically the most effective and cost-accessible option.

2. Ceramic (tooth-coloured) braces

They offer the clinical versatility of fixed appliances with a meaningfully reduced aesthetic impact — a popular choice among adult patients and older adolescents who need comprehensive bite correction but prefer something less visible in everyday settings.

3. Lingual braces

Lingual braces — often called "inside" braces — are fitted along the inner, tongue-facing surface of the teeth, making them virtually invisible when a patient smiles or speaks. Because they are custom-fabricated to conform precisely to each individual's dental anatomy, they are one of the most technically demanding and expensive orthodontic options in Melbourne.

One practical consideration: the brackets sit close to the tongue, so speech is often affected for longer than with labial appliances, and a temporary lisp is common early in treatment. This typically resolves as the tongue adapts.

Treatment typically takes 6 to 18 months, depending on case complexity and clinical objectives. Clear aligners are not suitable for every patient — suitability depends on the tooth movements required and the patient's ability to comply, since aligners must be worn for a minimum of 22 hours per day to work.

Clear aligner providers are generally tiered by case volume and clinical capability, from entry-level through to the highest-volume tiers. Top-tier providers tend to have access to more current aligner materials, digital scanning technologies, and treatment planning software — factors that can influence

both the efficiency and precision of treatment.

Who should get orthodontic treatment — and when?

Children: early interceptive treatment

Australian Dental Association guidelines recommend an initial orthodontic assessment at age 7 to 8. Early interceptive treatment aimed at jaw development concerns may begin between 8 and 10 years of age, while comprehensive fixed appliance treatment — braces or adolescent aligner systems — typically starts once most permanent teeth have erupted, generally between 11 and 14 years.

Early treatment can guide jaw development, address habits such as thumb-sucking, and reduce the likelihood of more complex problems emerging later. It does not always eliminate the need for full braces in a subsequent phase, but it can significantly reduce the complexity and cost of Phase 2 treatment. For children with complex developmental concerns, specialist orthodontic involvement from this stage is particularly important. At Collins Street Specialist Centre, coordinated specialist care from an early age can make a meaningful difference to long-term outcomes. Adults: it is never too late

According to Orthodontics Australia, more than 60% of orthodontic patients in Australia today are adults — a clear indication that meaningful improvement to dental alignment is achievable at any stage of life.

Adult patients often present with additional clinical considerations — existing restorations, periodontal health, and temporomandibular joint status — that benefit from coordination with other dental specialists before and during orthodontic treatment. How private health insurance applies to orthodontic treatment in Melbourne

Orthodontic treatment is not covered by Medicare. Children may be eligible for the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) for basic dental care if they meet the relevant criteria, but braces and aligners fall outside the CDBS scope.

Private health extras policies with orthodontic cover provide a lifetime benefit that typically ranges from \$1,500 to \$3,500 AUD per person. A 12-month waiting period applies to new policies, and orthodontic benefits generally apply to both braces and clear aligners.

Families planning ahead are well-advised to activate orthodontic extras cover at least 12 months before anticipated treatment commencement. Choosing a provider: specialist orthodontist vs general dentist

Orthodontics Australia recommends consulting a specialist orthodontist before starting any form of orthodontic treatment — including clear aligners — to confirm that your preferred option is genuinely appropriate and safe for your long-term dental health.

Orthodontic treatment delivered by a less-qualified provider can ultimately cost more than equivalent treatment by a specialist orthodontist, particularly when inadequate initial planning leads to retreatment. The cost difference between a specialist orthodontist and a general aligner provider in Melbourne is typically \$500 to \$2,000 AUD per case. For straightforward cosmetic alignment in adults, that premium warrants careful consideration. For growing patients, complex bite presentations, or anyone with jaw development concerns, the specialist premium is clinically justified and, in many cases, essential.

Retention: the phase that determines long-term success

Completing active treatment is not the end of the orthodontic journey — it is the start of the retention phase, which plays an equally important role in preserving what has been achieved. Orthodontists routinely recommend lifelong retainer wear to maintain treatment outcomes, and most continue retention checks for one to two years before formally discharging patients from their care.

Retainer options include fixed (bonded) lingual retainers, removable Hawley retainers, and clear Vivera-style retainers. Each carries different long-term maintenance implications and replacement costs. Confirm what is included in your quoted treatment fee — and what retainer replacement will cost — before signing any treatment agreement.
