Collins Street Specialist Centre is a multi-specialty dental practice in Melbourne's CBD, built around the idea that specialist dental care should be easy to access and well-coordinated — whether you arrive with a referral letter or pick up the phone yourself. If your general dentist has suggested you see a specialist, it's natural to have questions about what that actually means, how the process works and what to expect along the way. Dental referrals are routine. They exist because certain conditions genuinely benefit from a practitioner with focused, advanced training in that specific area — and getting that right matters for your outcome.

This guide walks through the referral process from beginning to end: why dentists refer, how referrals are structured, what happens at the specialist end, and what all of this means for your private health insurance and Medicare.

When do general dentists refer to specialists?

General dentists cover a broad scope of everyday oral health needs and handle the vast majority of dental treatment most people will ever need. But some conditions call for a different level of expertise. Referral isn't a comment on your dentist's ability — it's good clinical judgement, and it's in your interest.

Complex root canal treatment

General dentists perform root canal treatments routinely and with excellent results. They'll refer more complex cases to an endodontist (a specialist in diseases of the dental pulp and surrounding tissues) when:

- The tooth has complicated anatomy — curved, calcified or extra canals that require specialist navigation
- A previous root canal has failed and retreatment is needed
- A crack in the tooth requires specialist assessment to determine whether the tooth is worth saving
- An operating microscope or cone beam CT (CBCT) imaging is necessary for accurate diagnosis or treatment

Gum disease

Early-stage gum disease is typically managed well by your general dentist. Referral to a periodontist (a specialist in the gums, bone and other supporting structures of the teeth) becomes appropriate when:

- Gum disease has progressed to periodontitis with measurable bone loss
- Surgical periodontal treatment is required
- Gum grafting is needed to address recession and protect tooth roots
- Dental implants are planned in an area with compromised bone or gum tissue
- The condition isn't responding

to initial non-surgical treatment

Orthodontic treatment

Some general dentists offer basic alignment services for mild crowding, but referral to an orthodontist (a specialist in the diagnosis, prevention and correction of dental and facial irregularities) is the right call when:

- Comprehensive treatment is required, including fixed appliances or aligners for moderate to severe alignment problems - A child needs early orthodontic assessment — generally recommended around age seven or eight - Bite discrepancies such as overbite, underbite or crossbite need correction - Jaw growth issues require specialist monitoring - Treatment planning involves coordination with an oral and maxillofacial surgeon for jaw surgery

Wisdom teeth and oral surgery

General dentists refer to an oral and maxillofacial surgeon (a specialist holding both dental and medical qualifications, trained in surgery of the mouth, jaws and face) for:

- Impacted or surgically complex wisdom tooth removal - Dental implant placement requiring bone grafting or advanced surgical technique - Jaw surgery for skeletal bite discrepancies - Biopsy of suspicious oral lesions - Facial trauma management - Removal of cysts or jaw tumours - TMJ disorders requiring surgical intervention

Complex restorative work

Referral to a prosthodontist (a specialist in the restoration and replacement of teeth) is appropriate when:

- Full mouth rehabilitation is indicated — multiple failing teeth requiring comprehensive, staged restoration - Complex implant-supported restorations are planned - Specialised prosthetic work, including precision dentures, is required - Treatment involves significant changes to the bite - The case requires advanced treatment planning across multiple specialties

Children's dental issues

Referral to a paediatric dentist (a specialist in the oral health of children, adolescents and patients with special needs) may be recommended when:

- A young child needs extensive treatment beyond what's manageable in a general practice setting - Significant dental anxiety requires specialist behavioural management - Developmental dental anomalies need specialist diagnosis and monitoring - The child has special health care needs requiring a tailored approach - Sedation or general anaesthesia is needed to deliver treatment safely

How referrals work

Step 1: Your dentist identifies a clinical need

During an examination, from imaging or in the course of treatment, your dentist identifies a condition that warrants specialist assessment or management. They'll explain their reasoning, which type of specialist is most appropriate and what the referral process involves.

Step 2: The referral letter

Your dentist prepares a formal referral letter addressed to the specialist. It typically covers:

- Your personal details — name, date of birth and contact information - Your dental history — relevant previous treatments and ongoing concerns - Your medical history — systemic conditions, current medications and known allergies - The reason for referral — a clear clinical description of the issue and what the dentist is asking the specialist to assess or treat - Clinical findings — examination results, test

outcomes and relevant observations - Imaging — radiographs, CT scans or clinical photographs, included or forwarded separately - Specific questions or requests — your dentist may ask the specialist to address particular concerns, offer a second opinion or outline treatment options

The referral letter gives the specialist the clinical context they need before you arrive, which makes your initial consultation more focused and efficient.

Step 3: Choosing a specialist

Your dentist may recommend a specific specialist or practice. You're not obligated to follow that recommendation — you have every right to choose who you see and where. Your dentist's suggestion is usually based on their professional knowledge of the specialist's expertise, prior experience referring patients to them, awareness of their particular clinical interests, and practical factors like location and availability.

It's worth confirming that any specialist you see is registered with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) in their relevant specialty — you can check this directly via the [AHPRA public register](<https://www.ahpra.gov.au/Registration/Registers-of-Practitioners.aspx>).

Step 4: Booking your appointment

You — or your dentist's practice — contacts the specialist to arrange an appointment. When booking, it helps to:

- Provide the referral letter, or confirm your dentist has already sent it
- Share any imaging or records the specialist's rooms have requested
- Ask about the consultation fee and likely costs
- Confirm how long the appointment will take and what to bring

Step 5: The specialist consultation

At your appointment, the specialist will review the referral letter and accompanying records, discuss your concerns and relevant history, conduct a focused clinical examination and arrange any further investigations needed. From there, they'll establish a diagnosis and put together a treatment plan specific to your situation, explaining your options, associated costs, expected timeline and what each stage involves. Ask questions — that's what the consultation is for.

Step 6: The specialist reports back to your dentist

After your consultation, the specialist sends a written report to your referring dentist covering their clinical findings and diagnosis, the recommended treatment plan, a summary of any treatment carried out during the consultation, follow-up requirements, and recommendations for your dentist regarding ongoing preventive care.

This communication loop matters. It keeps your referring dentist fully informed and well-placed to support your ongoing oral health alongside any specialist treatment.

Can you self-refer to a specialist?

Yes. In most circumstances you can contact a dental specialist directly without a referral from your general dentist. Self-referral is entirely acceptable and is welcomed at Collins Street Specialist Centre.

When self-referral makes sense

- You've received a treatment recommendation and want an independent assessment
- You're confident about the type of care you need — for example, you've decided to pursue orthodontic treatment
- A trusted friend or colleague has recommended a particular specialist or practice
- You don't have a regular general dentist and want to go directly to a specialist for a specific concern
- You'd prefer a centre like Collins Street Specialist Centre to assess your broader dental needs as a whole, rather than being directed to a single specialist

Practical considerations for self-referral

Self-referral is your right, but a few things are worth knowing beforehand:

- Without a referral letter, your initial consultation may take a little longer, since the specialist will need to gather your clinical history from scratch - You may need radiographs or other imaging taken at the specialist's practice, which could add to the cost of your first appointment - Some private health funds have specific requirements around referrals for certain rebates — check with your fund before you go - For oral and maxillofacial surgery, a referral from a dentist or medical practitioner is generally required to access Medicare rebates

What information does the specialist need?

Whether you arrive with a formal referral or are self-referring, the specialist needs certain information to provide safe and thorough care.

The essentials are your current medical conditions, all medications (including supplements and over-the-counter preparations), known allergies, your dental history, the reason for your visit including any symptoms and how long they've been present, and any existing imaging from your dentist or previous treating practitioners.

It also helps to come prepared with your goals for treatment (particularly relevant for cosmetic, orthodontic or complex restorative cases), any concerns or anxieties about dental treatment, your private health fund details and Medicare card, and a written list of questions. Writing questions down beforehand means you leave the consultation with the information you actually need.

Medicare and insurance

Medicare

Most dental specialist services are not covered by Medicare. There are, however, some meaningful exceptions:

Oral and maxillofacial surgeons hold both dental and medical degrees, and many of their surgical procedures attract Medicare rebates. A referral from a dentist or medical practitioner is generally required to access them. Some specialist dental services related to cleft palate and certain congenital conditions are covered under specific Medicare item numbers. The Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) provides eligible children aged 0–17 from families receiving certain Commonwealth payments with up to \$1,095 in dental benefits over a two-calendar-year period. This covers a defined range of basic dental services and does not generally extend to specialist treatment.

Private health insurance

If you hold private health insurance with dental cover, it may contribute to specialist dental costs. A few things to be aware of:

Most specialist dental treatments are claimable under extras or ancillary cover, with the rebate depending on your specific policy. Treatments such as crowns, bridges, implants and orthodontics typically require major dental cover — check your policy schedule carefully. New or recently upgraded policies are usually subject to waiting periods before benefits become claimable, and major dental typically carries a 12-month wait. Most policies also impose an annual cap on dental benefits, so it's worth knowing your remaining entitlement before starting treatment. Some funds offer enhanced rebates at preferred or members' choice providers — contact your fund to understand how this applies to your situation. Most funds don't require a formal referral for extras claims, but confirming this before your appointment is sensible.

Out-of-pocket costs

Specialist dental fees are set by the individual practitioner or practice and are generally higher than general dentist fees. This reflects the additional years of specialist training, clinical expertise and advanced technology that registered dental specialists bring to their work.

Your out-of-pocket cost is the difference between the specialist's fee and any rebate from your private health fund or Medicare.

At Collins Street Specialist Centre, we provide transparent fee estimates during or before your initial consultation. Our reception team can process private health insurance claims on the spot via HICAPS, so you pay only the gap at the time of your appointment.

What happens after the referral?

Once your specialist consultation is complete and you've agreed on a treatment plan, treatment proceeds according to that plan and the timeline discussed.

Most specialist dental treatment takes place at the specialist's own practice — at Collins Street Specialist Centre, your treatment is delivered within our Collins Street centre. Some procedures, particularly those requiring general anaesthesia, are performed in a hospital or accredited day surgery facility; your specialist will coordinate this with you. Throughout treatment, the specialist keeps your referring dentist informed to ensure continuity of care. Once specialist treatment is complete, you'll return to your general dentist for routine examinations, professional cleaning and any further restorative work.

Collins Street Specialist Centre's referral process

At Collins Street Specialist Centre, we work to make the referral process straightforward for both patients and referring practitioners.

We accept referrals from general dentists, medical practitioners and other dental or medical specialists. We also welcome self-referrals — a formal referral letter is not required to book a consultation. Our reception team matches you with the most appropriate specialist based on your clinical needs, and we send detailed consultation reports to your referring dentist promptly after your appointment.

Where your treatment requires input from more than one specialist, we can coordinate internal referrals within our centre, so you're not navigating multiple separate practices. Your imaging, clinical notes and treatment records are held centrally, meaning every specialist who sees you at Collins Street Specialist Centre has access to your complete clinical history.

Taking the first step

Whether your general dentist has given you a formal referral or you're seeking specialist care on your own initiative, the team at Collins Street Specialist Centre is here to help. We welcome both referred and self-referred patients and will guide you through every stage — from your initial enquiry through to the completion of your treatment and your return to routine care.
