Specialist dental care near Carlton and Parkville. Close to University of Melbourne and Royal Melbourne Hospital. All dental specialties at CSSC, 220 Collins St.

Details:

Collins Street Specialist Centre – Specialist dentist Carlton and Parkville

Carlton and Parkville sit just north of Melbourne's CBD, and they carry a lot of weight for two relatively compact suburbs. The University of Melbourne, the Royal Melbourne Hospital, the Melbourne Museum, and the Royal Exhibition Building all call this area home. The communities that have grown up around these institutions are genuinely varied: students, academics, medical professionals, families with deep roots in the area, and newer arrivals who've come for work or study. What they tend to share is a high standard for the services they use, and dental care is no exception.

Collins Street Specialist Centre (CSSC), on Level 1 of the Manchester Unity Building at 220 Collins Street, is a short tram ride south of both suburbs. With more than 25 dental specialists and 80 clinicians practising across every major dental specialty, CSSC gives Carlton and Parkville patients access to genuinely comprehensive specialist care without needing to chase referrals across the city.

Getting to CSSC from Carlton and Parkville

By tram

Carlton and Parkville connect well to Collins Street through Melbourne's tram network:

- **From Lygon Street, Carlton:** Routes 1 and 6 run south along Swanston Street into the CBD. Get off at the Collins Street/Swanston Street intersection — the Manchester Unity Building is on the north-east corner, directly opposite Melbourne Town Hall. Allow about 10 to 12 minutes from central Carlton. - **From Royal Parade, Parkville:** Route 19 heads south along Royal Parade and Elizabeth Street. Collins Street is one block east of Elizabeth Street. Journey time is roughly 10 to 15 minutes. - **From Grattan Street / University of Melbourne:** Routes 1, 3, 5, 6, 16, 64, 67, and 72 all run along Swanston Street past the university and continue south to the Collins Street stop. That's about 7 to 10 minutes.

Most of these routes pass through Melbourne's free tram zone once you're in the CBD, so the final leg of the trip costs nothing.

On foot

Walking is a reasonable option from parts of Carlton:

- From Lygon Street at Grattan Street: around 15 to 20 minutes heading south through the university precinct and into the CBD - From Carlton Gardens or the Melbourne Museum: around 12 to 15 minutes heading south-west - From the Royal Melbourne Hospital area in Parkville: around 20 to 25 minutes heading south

The route takes you through the university campus and into the CBD streetscape — a pleasant journey, particularly during the warmer months.

By car

Driving from Carlton or Parkville takes about 5 to 10 minutes depending on traffic. Nearby parking includes the QV Melbourne car park (accessible from Carlton via Lonsdale Street), Emporium Melbourne, and Wilson Parking facilities scattered through the CBD.

By bicycle

Carlton and Parkville both have dedicated cycling lanes connecting to the CBD. Bike hoops and share bike stations are available near the Manchester Unity Building.

Serving the Carlton and Parkville community

University of Melbourne students and staff

The Parkville campus is home to tens of thousands of students and staff, and the dental needs across that population are wide-ranging.

Students, domestic and international alike, commonly come in for:

- **Wisdom tooth assessment and removal** — the late teens and early twenties are when wisdom tooth problems tend to surface, and getting them assessed early matters - **Orthodontic treatment** — many students start or continue orthodontic care during their university years; clear aligners work well for those who'd rather not wear visible braces - **General dental care** — check-ups, fillings, and preventive treatment during what is often a busy and health-neglecting period of life - **Emergency dental care** — acute pain or injuries from university sport that need prompt attention

International students face a particular set of challenges: an unfamiliar healthcare system, possible language differences, and dental care standards that may differ significantly from what they're used to at home. CSSC's clinical team sees patients from a wide range of backgrounds and can help navigate Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) and what it covers for dental treatment.

University staff and academics often need appointments that fit around teaching and research schedules. Being close to the Parkville campus makes that easier to manage.

Families in Carlton and Carlton North

Carlton North especially has a strong family presence, with parents who pay attention to schools, community spaces, and healthcare. For those families, CSSC offers:

- **Paediatric dentistry** — specialist paediatric dentists who work well with children at every age, manage dental anxiety thoughtfully, and help establish positive associations with dental care from an early age - **Orthodontics for children and adolescents** — early assessment from around age seven can catch developing bite problems before they become harder to treat - **Family scheduling** — parents can book their own appointments alongside their children's visits, which saves a lot of back-and-forth

Medical professionals in Parkville

Parkville's medical precinct includes the Royal Melbourne Hospital, the Royal Women's Hospital, the Royal Children's Hospital, the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, and a cluster of research institutes. The doctors, nurses, researchers, and allied health professionals working there tend to bring a well-informed perspective to their own healthcare.

They generally understand the difference between generalist and specialist care, and they recognise the value of a model where specialists can consult each other directly rather than communicating

through referral letters. CSSC's structure makes sense to them because it mirrors what they know from their own clinical environments.

Long-term Carlton residents

Carlton has a rich multicultural history, with well-established Italian, Greek, and other communities who have lived in the suburb across generations. Many long-term residents come in with complex dental needs that have built up over time:

- **Periodontal care** — gum disease becomes more common with age, and moderate to advanced cases need specialist management - **Prosthodontic treatment** — replacing missing teeth with implants, bridges, or dentures to restore both function and appearance - **Restoration of worn or damaged teeth** — addressing decades of wear, grinding habits, or older restorations that are reaching the end of their useful life - **Oral surgery** — removing problematic teeth, managing oral pathology, and other procedures that go beyond general dental scope

Comprehensive specialist services

CSSC covers every recognised dental specialty, so Carlton and Parkville patients can get all the specialist care they need in one place.

Orthodontics Tooth alignment and bite correction for patients of all ages, using metal braces, ceramic braces, lingual braces, or clear aligners. Treatment plans are built around each patient's anatomy, function, lifestyle, and what they want the end result to look like.

Endodontics Specialist root canal treatment to save infected or structurally compromised teeth. CSSC's endodontists use operating microscopes for precision and rotary instrumentation for patient comfort — including in complex cases or teeth that have been treated before.

Periodontics Diagnosis and treatment of gum disease across the full range, from early gingivitis through to advanced periodontitis. Periodontists at CSSC also place dental implants and perform guided bone and tissue regeneration where needed.

Prosthodontics Restoration and replacement of teeth using crowns, bridges, veneers, dentures, and implant-supported prostheses. The focus is on restorations that function well and look natural over the long term.

Oral and maxillofacial surgery Surgical treatment of wisdom teeth, implants, corrective jaw surgery, temporomandibular joint disorders, facial trauma, and oral pathology. CSSC's oral and maxillofacial surgeons hold dual qualifications as medical doctors and dentists, which reflects the breadth of what this specialty actually involves.

Paediatric dentistry Specialist care for children and adolescents, from first dental visits through to the teenage years. This includes preventive fluoride treatments, managing decay and dental trauma, and handling developmental anomalies in a clinical environment that's designed to be genuinely comfortable for kids.

General and cosmetic dentistry Examinations, restorations, hygiene appointments, tooth whitening, veneers, and other cosmetic treatments. General dentists at CSSC also coordinate referrals to in-house specialists when the clinical picture calls for it, keeping care within the one practice.

The multidisciplinary advantage

A lot of dental conditions benefit from input across more than one specialty. At CSSC, that collaboration happens naturally because all the specialists are in the same building and can communicate directly:

- A university student with impacted wisdom teeth might need an oral and maxillofacial surgeon for removal, plus an orthodontic review if the impaction is affecting alignment - A parent with extensive

existing dental work might need a prosthodontic treatment plan alongside endodontic re-treatment of a failing root canal - A child with early bite discrepancies gets coordinated input from both a paediatric dentist and an orthodontist - A medical professional dealing with gum disease and tooth loss might work with a periodontist for disease management and implant placement, then a prosthodontist for the final restorations

Managing care across multiple separate practices is time-consuming and creates gaps in communication. Having everyone in one place removes that friction and tends to produce better clinical outcomes overall.

Modern facilities

The Manchester Unity Building is a heritage building, and CSSC's practice within it brings together the character of a heritage building with contemporary clinical technology:

- Digital radiography, with substantially reduced radiation exposure compared to conventional film
- Cone-beam CT (CBCT) scanning for detailed three-dimensional imaging of teeth, bone, and surrounding structures
- Intraoral digital scanners, which remove the need for conventional impression trays
- Modern surgical suites for oral and maxillofacial procedures
- IV sedation for patients with significant dental anxiety
- Comfortable reception and waiting areas

What to expect as a new patient

Your first appointment at CSSC will typically include:

1. A thorough clinical examination of your teeth, gums, jaw, and overall oral health
2. Diagnostic imaging where clinically indicated, including digital radiographs or CBCT as appropriate
3. A discussion of any concerns, symptoms, or treatment goals you want to address
4. A plain-language explanation of what was found and what your options are
5. Where specialist input is needed, arrangements for assessment within CSSC rather than an external referral

There's no pressure to commit to anything on the day. You'll get clear information about your options, realistic timeframes, and associated costs, and you can take the time you need before deciding how to proceed.
