If you're weighing up orthodontic treatment, you'll quickly find yourself choosing between two main paths: traditional braces and Invisalign clear aligners. Both work. Both move teeth effectively. But they do it differently, and which one suits you depends on the complexity of your case, your clinical presentation, and how your life actually runs day to day.

Here's what you need to know.

Understanding your orthodontic options

"Braces" covers more ground than most people realise. There are three distinct fixed appliance systems, each with its own clinical strengths — and then there's Invisalign. Let's break them down.

Traditional metal braces

Metal braces are the most widely recognised option. Small metal brackets are bonded to the front surface of each tooth, connected by a thin metal archwire. Your orthodontist adjusts the wire periodically to apply controlled, graduated forces that shift your teeth into position.

The mechanics: the archwire threads through each bracket slot, held in place by elastic ligatures. The sustained pressure this creates causes the periodontal ligament to remodel, allowing teeth to move incrementally. Adjustment appointments run every four to six weeks.

****Best suited to:**** - Complex cases with significant crowding, spacing, or bite discrepancies - Children and adolescents, where compliance with a removable appliance is less reliable - Cases requiring precise rotation, torque control, or vertical tooth movement - Patients who want a well-researched, fixed solution that works regardless of daily habits

Ceramic braces

Ceramic braces work on the same principles as metal braces, but the brackets are made from tooth-coloured or clear ceramic material. They're considerably less noticeable while delivering the same

clinical control.

The mechanics are identical — brackets, archwire, ligatures — with the difference being aesthetic. The ceramic brackets closely match your natural tooth shade.

****Best suited to:**** - Adults and older adolescents who want fixed orthodontics without the metal look - Patients who need the precision of traditional braces but prefer something less visible - Anyone who'd rather not manage the daily routine of removing and reinserting a removable appliance

Lingual braces

Lingual braces are bonded to the tongue-facing (inner) surface of your teeth, making them completely invisible from the outside. Every bracket is custom-fabricated to fit the unique contour of each individual tooth.

Because no two teeth share the same inner surface shape, lingual braces demand a high level of specialist expertise and precise laboratory work.

****Best suited to:**** - Adults in professional or public-facing roles who need genuinely invisible fixed treatment - Patients who want the biomechanical capability of fixed braces with no visible hardware at all - Complex cases where clear aligner therapy isn't the right clinical fit

Invisalign clear aligners

Invisalign uses a series of custom-made, clear thermoplastic aligners to move teeth progressively. Each set is worn for roughly one to two weeks before you move to the next in the sequence.

The process starts with intraoral 3D scanning and digital treatment planning — your orthodontist maps out the full movement sequence before treatment begins. A complete series of aligners is then manufactured, each one shifting the teeth a small amount further. You wear them for 20–22 hours per day, removing them only to eat, drink anything other than water, brush, and floss.

****Best suited to:**** - Mild to moderate crowding, spacing, and bite issues - Adults and older adolescents who prioritise aesthetics and flexibility - Patients who want to remove their appliance for meals or significant occasions - People who can genuinely commit to the required wear time

How the options compare

Treatment duration

Metal braces typically run 12–36 months depending on case complexity. For more involved presentations, the three-dimensional control they give the orthodontist can actually make them more efficient than aligners.

Ceramic braces are broadly comparable in duration to metal, though some ceramic bracket systems generate slightly more friction, which can add a few weeks in certain cases.

Lingual braces are generally similar in duration to conventional fixed appliances, though the initial adaptation period can be a little longer given the bracket placement.

Invisalign typically runs 6–18 months for mild to moderate cases. More complex presentations take longer, and some conditions can't be fully resolved with aligners alone.

Comfort

With any fixed appliance, there's usually a few days of soreness after each adjustment. Metal and ceramic brackets can occasionally irritate the lips and cheeks — orthodontic wax helps. Lingual braces may affect speech and tongue comfort initially, though most patients adapt within a few weeks.

Invisalign is generally more comfortable. You'll notice mild pressure when you switch to a new aligner set, but without brackets and wires, there's no risk of soft-tissue irritation. The smooth plastic trays are much gentler on the inside of your mouth.

Aesthetics

Metal braces are the most visible option. Modern bracket designs are more streamlined than older versions, and coloured ligatures give younger patients some room for personalisation.

Ceramic braces are much less noticeable. The tooth-coloured brackets blend well, though the archwire may still be visible on close inspection.

Lingual braces are completely invisible from the outside — the gold standard for aesthetics in fixed orthodontic treatment.

Invisalign is near-invisible in everyday use. The clear trays are difficult to detect in normal conversation, which is a big part of why they're so popular with adult patients.

Cost in Melbourne

Fees vary based on case complexity, treatment length, and the appliance chosen.

- **Metal braces** are generally the most cost-accessible fixed option, typically starting from around \$6,000–\$9,000 AUD for standard cases - **Ceramic braces** run marginally higher, reflecting the cost of the ceramic bracket components - **Lingual braces** are the most significant investment of the fixed appliance options, given the laboratory customisation and specialist expertise involved - **Invisalign** is broadly comparable to ceramic braces for most cases, with fees varying by the total number of aligners needed

Day-to-day maintenance

With braces, you'll need to avoid hard, sticky, and crunchy foods that can dislodge or damage brackets and wires. Oral hygiene takes more effort — interdental brushes and specialised cleaning aids become part of your routine. Adjustment appointments happen every four to six weeks.

With Invisalign, you can eat whatever you like — you just remove the aligners first. Brushing and flossing stays the same as usual. The trade-off is discipline: 20–22 hours of wear per day is non-negotiable. Fall short of that consistently, and treatment slows down or the results are compromised.

Effectiveness by condition

Not every orthodontic problem responds equally well to every treatment. Here's a general clinical reference:

What actually matters when choosing

Your lifestyle and work context

If discretion is a genuine priority — you're in a client-facing role, or you're simply not comfortable with visible hardware — Invisalign or lingual braces are worth serious consideration. On the other hand, if you have doubts about your ability to stay disciplined with a removable appliance, a fixed system removes that variable entirely. It works around the clock whether you're thinking about it or not.

Compliance

This is where Invisalign can fall down. The treatment depends on you wearing the aligners consistently. If there's real uncertainty about whether you can manage 20–22 hours per day, a fixed appliance will likely deliver better results — not because it's inherently more effective, but because it doesn't rely on daily behavioural follow-through to function as intended.

Case complexity

This is the most clinically important factor. A specialist orthodontist will assess whether your presentation is best handled with aligners, a fixed appliance, or a combination of both. Cases that look simple on the surface sometimes carry underlying complexities — skeletal discrepancies, tooth angulation issues, periodontal considerations — that make one approach clearly more appropriate than the other. This is not something to guess at.

Age

Invisalign is available for adolescents, but younger patients often get more predictable results with fixed appliances, where compliance isn't a factor. Adult patients tend to prefer the discretion of clear aligners or lingual braces, and their capacity for consistent wear makes them well-suited candidates for aligner therapy.

Why see a specialist orthodontist?

General dentists can provide certain orthodontic treatments, including Invisalign, within their scope of practice. Specialist orthodontists have completed an additional two to three years of full-time postgraduate university training focused specifically on tooth movement, occlusal development, and dentofacial orthopaedics.

In practical terms, that means more precise diagnosis and treatment planning, better management of complex or atypical cases, the clinical judgement to recognise when a treatment plan needs adjusting mid-course, and a higher likelihood of stable, long-term outcomes.

You can confirm whether your treating orthodontist holds specialist registration via the [Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA)](<https://www.ahpra.gov.au/>) register.

At CSSC, all our orthodontists are AHPRA-registered specialists who have completed rigorous postgraduate training. They use intraoral 3D digital scanning for treatment planning and monitoring.

The CSSC multidisciplinary model
